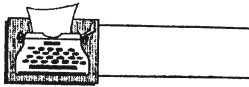


Girls Let's Shop

Deacon's Corner

A Preacher from a "bible-only" sect told me that there were no female angels. I said that God made both male and female angels. He told me to find where in the Bible it was written and he would apologize. I don't need his apology, but I would like to know---are there female angels?

Actually, your preacher friend is right. Gender, while it has an impact on the mind, is something rooted in biology and in our physical bodies. Angels are spiritual beings with intellect and will, but no physical form.

In order to relate to humans, angels do sometimes appear in the guise of human beings, and at those times, they may appear male or female. But this is an illusion and does not reflect truly what the angel is. Though there may be nothing to prevent an angel from manifesting in a feminine form, the appearance of angels recorded in Scripture all involve appearing either as a man or with a non-human form.

Incidentally, we see many pictures of angels as humans with wings, but it isn't found in the Bible, either. Images with wings come from the pre-Christian artwork.

With which pope was the term pope first used? My neighbor, a Presbyterian minister, claims that in the early Christian Church the heads of the church were termed "bishops" and there was no pope.

The terms "pope" began to be used as a title for ecclesiastical officials in the second century A.D. However, it was used differently than it is now. The term papa, which simply means father, was often used for high-ranking ecclesiastics of various areas. It was recognized, even in this early period, that the bishops of Rome had a special authority among the bishops of the world, and so eventually the title came to be restricted to him. He was the Pope, the father of the Christians on earth.

As far as when this happened, it was a process, and so it is not possible to specify a single individual with which the usage began.

November, 2011 Fifth Grade Class

The 5th Grade class is learning many exciting things this year.

In religion the 5th graders are learning how to live our faith and come closer to God. We are learning about the Beatitudes, sacramentals, saints, and celebrating the Sacraments. We will soon be focusing on the Sacraments of Initiation. We are also involved in preparing for the Archdiocese's religion test called the ACRE. It is given in January.

In social studies 5th graders are busy working on projects and geography. Our first quarter project included geography topics, which we are learning about in class. They researched and found ten interesting facts about their topic. They learned how to do a title page, bibliography, and rewrite our information. Our projects and class work for the rest of the year will include researching topics and learning about the Ancient world and Africa.

In reading we are learning about and reading different types of genre, including fantasy, nonfiction, informational articles, poetry, short stories, historical fiction, biographies, and auto- biographies. We are also continuing our Accelerated Reading program. Our monthly goal is to read and pass two fiction and two nonfiction books. Both of these combined have really helped our reading growth. We also work in our vocabulary books.

In our English classes we are working on grammar, editing, spelling, and creative writing. We do things a little differently in spelling than most classes. Mrs. Klamo actually grades how well we apply the spelling rules instead of giving us spelling tests. At first it was a little harder for us, but we seem to have adjusted. We use our editing, spelling, and grammar skills to help us become better writers. We do all of this to help prepare the 5th graders for the CBE writing prompt in February.

Minutes: Parish Pastoral Council Meeting
August 16, 2011 Urbain Hall 7:00 p.m.**

Members Present: Beverly Flaig, Judy Fritz, Ken Gill, Al Heister, Todd Helton, Bob Kaiser; Ex-Officio Members: Rev. Jeff Bacon, Susan Schnell

Members Absent: Dan Barth, Scott Smith, Andy Weltzer

Meeting was called to order at 7:00 p.m.; Father Jeff opened with prayer.

Approval of Minutes: Minutes from the June 14, 2011 meeting were reviewed; upon motion made and seconded, the Minutes were approved.

Committee Reports:

Education Commission – Sue Schnell reported.

- The school has received full accreditation with the State of Ohio for the next four years
- Enrollment is holding; it is up from last year
- Hired a new staff member, third grade teacher Helen Barton
- Interviewing for speech and language teacher, and posting for a part-time nurse
- I Pads are in for 6th, 7th and 8th grades; staff is being trained - its features were demonstrated by Sue
- New Math series for K-8 was purchased; it includes digital components for I Pad access – will decrease book bag weight by 30 lbs.
- Wi-Fi is being put into classrooms in next couple weeks; will result in 50% reduction of purchasing books
- New Social Studies text books are being looked at for this year

Finance Commission – Bob Young reported.

- Month of July resulted in an operating loss of (\$38,000) - not unusual for July; compared to last year, up \$8,000 (stewardship with introduction to electronic giving contributed)
- Archdiocese loan balance down to \$19,888
- In July, the Archdiocese began an assessment of 5.7% on the loan (after two-year moratorium), in addition to the 7% interest
- Has been an expensive year, e.g. cafeteria renovation, parking lot repaving, etc.
- Collections are up

Queen of Peace Athletic Club (QPAC) – Mike McKinney reported.

- Volleyball sign-ups were held Aug 10; gym to be rented on Wednesdays for games

(Parish Council Meeting Minutes 8/16/2011 Continued)

- Indian Ridge Golf Outing / Steak Fry was held July 30; profit of \$6,450, increase from last year's outing
- May hold two separate events next year; looking for suggestions how to involve students and parents
- A check for \$640 was given to Father Jeff, 10% of profits, as on-going donation from QPAC from all fundraisers toward church repairs / wish list
- A portable sound system for the gymnasium was purchased; now deciding where to store, at school or gym cage
- Basketball season – guidelines will be established in next month or two

Building and Grounds Committee – no report.

Parents Group – Sue Schnell reported.

- To limit parents from receiving multiple fundraising requests, getting samples to make decision on what to purchase; also cutting out competition
- Collecting canned goods for St. Raphael, to be turned in at School Open House Sunday, August 21
- Uniform exchange will be offered at no charge, uniforms will be on table to come and swap out
- Volunteer opportunities are available for sign-up; push on to get more people involved

Parish Religious Education Program (PREP) –

Randi Hom reported.

- In a collaborative effort with Youth Ministry, PREP will be transitioning over from Mary Ann Estridge to Randi
- Class starts September 18; registration forms have been updated and now include permission slip and medical information
- Teacher Beth Holley is returning to the classroom
- Youth volunteers will help with 7-8th grades in a team approach
- Along with the Bible and Catechism, an interactive approach with hands-on learning activities will be developed, e.g. game playing related to what is being learned, short videos, working together on projects, small group discussions

- **Upcoming Dates:**
Open House Sunday August 21; Degree on Child Protection class for volunteers will be held
Confirmation: April 18, 2012
First Communion: April 21 and 22, 2012

Youth Ministry – Randi Hom reported.

- Exploring expanding Sunday evening meetings to include some Friday and Saturday evenings
- Planning to invite and involve youth (grades 6-12) with parents in the September 20 General Information Session to introduce changes in the Mass, September 27 five-week study “A Biblical Walk through the Mass,” as well as Bible Study of the Gospel of Matthew beginning in November
- E-mails were sent to parents regarding their inviting the youth to their homes for learning and fun activities ; to date:
A bonfire is scheduled for October 15
A visit is to be arranged to learn about the basement volunteer ministry of the Krabbe's of sewing and distributing vestments
- The youth have asked to be involved in more service activities; plans include
Preparing and serving meals the homeless shelter Serve City
Participating in community meals at The Presbyterian Church in September
Working with youth minister Marv Nieport at St. Maximilian Kolbe Parish

Pastor's comments: Father Jeff expressed his feeling that the Parish is doing well, running the way it should be; he is very pleased and hopeful for its future.

The Power of Youth Ministry

My purpose of submitting this personal reflection is to encourage parents and teens to get involved in youth ministry. I have been fortunate to have been a youth group member in high school as well as one of the leaders in my twenties. We are so blessed to have a part time staff member here at Queen of Peace to plan and host a variety of activities, yet, there is still the push to get more kids involved in making a strong youth ministry program.

In high school, my parents forced me to attend youth group. I would complain or try to say that I was “too busy”, but after going to the meetings and events I was happy I had gone. The youth group allowed me to build strong friendships, talk with adults for advice or counsel, learn about God’s love, and serve those in need. As we all know, high school years are the most challenging and tempting for adolescents. Having to attend youth group meetings kept me accountable for my actions and steered me in the right direction.

In my twenties, my husband and I both volunteered with a group of other adults to plan youth group events. The big events were well attended and very powerful. As more and more activities were planned, the numbers of kids declined through the years. The frustration in having to compete with all extra curricular activities and busy schedules of teens was the “fall” of youth group.

Father Jeff felt the need to revive and rebuild the youth ministry at Queen of Peace by hiring Randi Hom. How lucky we are that every week there is something planned for our 6-12th graders. Unfortunately, the numbers of kids attending are not where they should be. This is not just happening at Queen of Peace but throughout the world. There is a call to getting teens involved in their Catholic Christian faith. In reading *The Catholic Telegraph*, there is a push for raising a family with “Christ at the Center.” In reading the *Hamilton Journal* (Oct. 2), there was an article about parents and their mission statement for their children. The author states that most parents want their child to be happy and successful, but in past generations parents would have wanted to raise

a responsible citizen who felt obligated to their neighbors and culture. Lastly, in watching the movie *Courageous* that was just released in theaters at the end of September, the theme of the entire movie was a reminder for parents that their goal should be in building their child's faith. The sports, jobs, future success, etc. of our children will not matter or be accounted for in their eternal salvation. The social media (TV, video games, music) is dominating our youth at their most vulnerable/critical age.

Youth ministry is trying to reach kids at this point of their life (grades 6-12), to build a strong relationship with God before they graduate and enter the "real world." Youth ministry provides the opportunities and tools of living out their faith as they become responsible adult citizens. I encourage you to get your child or children involved in youth ministry here at Queen of Peace. Make this your resolution!

"And with Your Spirit"

Probably the most noticeable change for the laity in the revised translation of *The Roman Missal* will be the response to "The Lord be with you," which restores the phrase "And with your spirit" in place of "And also with you." This change is specifically called for by *Liturgiam Authenticam*, the instruction for the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments regarding the translation of liturgical texts. It states that the Latin phrase, *Et cum spiritu tuo*, must be translated as literally as possible. English is the only major European language that does not mention the spirit in the current translation of this response; the Greek liturgy of the Eastern Churches also employs the equivalent of "And with your spirit." So the new form has both tradition and widespread use on its side. Underlying the use are scriptural and theological reasons.

This ancient Christian use of "spirit," in both Greek and Latin, was strange to the ancient world. "Nothing like it is known outside Christian writing" (Paulinus Milner, "Et Cum Spiritu Tuo" in *Studies in Pastoral Liturgy*, vol. 3. ed. By Placid Murray, OSB, Dublin: The Furrow Trust, 1967. p. 202). "With your spirit" was long thought to be a Semitic idiom meaning nothing more than "with you." The Hebrew word *nephesh* means "soul" or "spirit," but it can also mean "self." But the Hebrew word behind "with you spirit" is not *nephesh* but rather another Hebrew term, *ruah*, which means "breath" or "spirit." The Greek word for spirit, *pneuma*, is never used in the Old Testament to render *nephesh*, but only when translating *ruah*. Thus, it seems clear that the use of "spirit" in the liturgy is not intended merely as an euphemism for "you" but bears some other special theological significance.

Sometimes, Saint Paul calls the gifts of the Holy Spirit *pneumata* (cf. 1 Corinthians 14:12: "So with yourselves, since you are eager for *pneumatōn*,

spiritual gifts..." and 14:32, "The spiritual gifts of the prophets are subject of the prophets"; see similar usage in Revelation 22:6 and 19:10). The Episcopal ordination prayer of *The Apostolic Tradition* (third or fourth century AD) asks God for the "spirit of leadership": "And now also pour forth the power which comes from you, of the *spirit* of leadership which you gave to your beloved Child, Jesus Christ, and which he accorded to your holy apostles who have founded the Church in everyplace...." This ordinary prayer, then, specifically refers to a gift of the spirit that was given to Christ, which Christ in turn bestowed on the apostles, and which this prayer shows is bestowed upon bishops in the Church. The ordination prayer of priests similarly asks, "Look upon your servant who is here and grant him the *spirit* of grace and of council of the presbytery so that he may aid and govern your people with a pure heart...." In the prayer for deacons: "grant the *spirit* of grace and zeal to your servant."

Given the petitions employed in these ordination prayer, it is noteworthy that the phrase, "And with your spirit" is used only in response to an ordained minister. The non-ordained member leading the assembly in prayer (for example, at a wake service, a Holy Communion service, the Liturgy of the Hours), would never say "The Lord be with you" because, at least in part, they do not receive the phrase in return "And with your spirit." The "spirit" mentioned here refers specifically to the spirit received in ordination. It is an affirmation by the assembly that the ordained minister has received the appropriate anointing with the spirit to make him the leader in sacramental ministry. This usage has a special beauty: it is less about the *person* of the priest than about the *office of the priesthood*, which is supported and guaranteed by the Spirit of God given in ordination. Early Church Father, such as John Chrysostom, Theodore of Mopsuestia, Narsai of Nisibis, and Abraham bar Lipheh explicitly back this interpretation.

One scripture usage may be set in objection to this interpretation: Galatians 6:18, Philippians 4:23, and Philemon 24 all use "spirit" in a more general sense as addressed to the whole Church: "The grace of the Lord Jesus Christ be with your spirit." Saint Paul is not referring here to the particular gifts of the Spirit possessed by each member of the local Church, because "spirit" is in the singular. Rather, he is referring to that gift of the Spirit which each local Church possesses in so as it is a unity in Christ for the worship of the Father (Milner, p. 206). In this sense, the ordained minister represents the whole Church in a way that the non-ordained does not. For this reason, the laity may offer a blessing in their own name only, whereas the ordained bless in the name of the Church – because of the "spirit:" they have received in ordination.
